AFL 2023 2ND ELIMINATION FINAL ST KILDA V GREATER WESTERN SYDNEY

Welcome to the first match between
St Kilda and Greater Western Sydney at the Melbourne Cricket Ground

ST KILDA IN THE FINALS

St Kilda have played in a total of 54 finals, winning 22 and losing 31, with one draw. Of these, eight were grand finals of which they have won one, lost six and drawn one. Three players hold the record for the most finals played with 17 each, Nick Dal Santo, Robert Harvey and Nick Riewoldt. Nick Riewoldt also holds the record for the most finals goals with 41. Allan Jeans is their only premierships coach with their 1966 victory. Their only Norm Smith Medallist is Lenny Hayes in their 2010 drawn grand final. Their highest finals score is 24.14 (158) against Essendon in a 1973 elimination final. Their lowest finals score is 3.8 (26) against Carlton in a 1908 semi final. Their highest grand final score is 13.16 (94) when they were defeated by Adelaide in 1997. Their lowest grand final score is 5.13 (43) when they were defeated by Fitzroy in 1913. The record for the most goals in a final is held by Tony Lockett who kicked nine against Geelong in a 1991 elimination final.

GREATER WESTERN SYDNEY IN THE FINALS

Greater Western Sydney have played in a total of 13 finals with seven wins and six losses. One of these was the 2019 grand final where they went down to Richmond by 89 points. This has been their only grand final appearance. Nick Haynes and Jacob Hopper hold the record for the most finals appearances with 13 each. Toby Greene holds the record for the most finals goals with 20. The club's highest score in a final is 19.11 (125) against the West Coast Eagles in the 2017 first semi final. Their lowest finals score is 3.7 (25) against Richmond in the 2019 grand final. Steve Johnson holds their record for the most goals in a final with six against the West Coast Eagles in 2017.

THEIR ONLY DRAW

Round 5, 2018, the ANZAC Round, saw these two sides meet at Docklands. GWS was sitting on top of the ladder after Round 4 and St Kilda 16th. The score difference between the two sides at the end of the first three quarters did not reach double figures, with GWS ahead by three points at the end of the first quarter, St Kilda by five points at half-time and GWS by nine points at the last break. With St Kilda kicking four goals one behind to GWS's two goals four behinds in the last quarter, the final siren sounded with both sides sitting on 73 points. Inaccurate kicking clearly played a part in GWS not being able to overcome the much lower placed Saints. **St Kilda 10.13 (73) drew with GWS 9.19 (73)**. Paddy McCartin was the Saints' only multiple goalscorer with three, while Jeremy Cameron, Brett Deledio and Ryan Griffen each kicked two for GWS.

PLAYED FOR BOTH

Josh Bruce was born in the ACT and played junior football for the Eastlake Football Club. He was drafted by GWS as an ACT zone selection to play in their TAC Cup in 2010 and continued to play for them in 2011 while the club was competing in the NEAFL. He made his AFL debut for the Giants in Round 5, 2012, against the Western Bulldogs. After playing three senior games for GWS in 2012 and 11 in 2013, mainly in defence, Bruce was traded to St Kilda. From 2014 to 2019 he played 99 games for the Saints, kicking 168 goals. Toward the end of the 2014 season he was tried up forward and in 2015 he was St Kilda's leading goalkicker with 50. He kicked 38 goals in 2016 and 36 in 2017. At the conclusion of the 2019 season he was traded to the Western Bulldogs and played 50 games for them from 2020 to 2023, kicking 63 goals. Bruce announced his retirement on August 22, 2023, effective immediately.

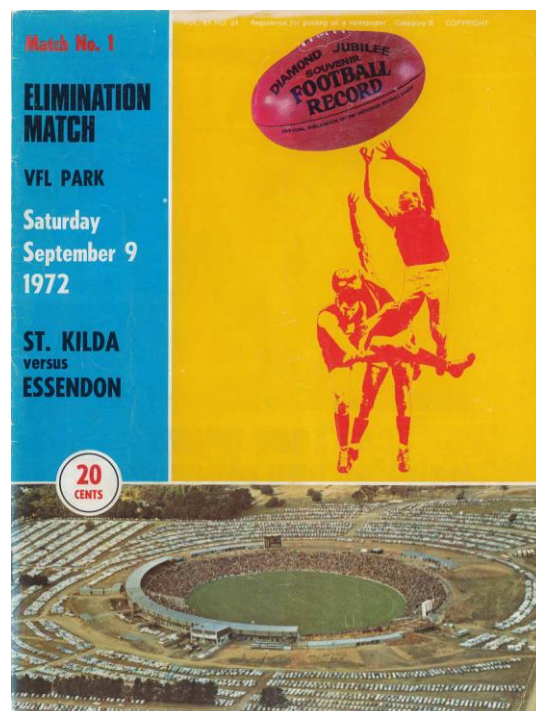

ELIMINATION FINALS EXPLAINED

The elimination final was first played in 1972 following the introduction of the McIntyre final five system. Elimination finals were played from 1972 to 1993 inclusive and were re-introduced in 2000. Between 1972 and 1990 the elimination final was played between the teams which finished fourth and fifth on the ladder. The loser was eliminated and the winner proceeded to the first semi final.

In 1991, when the admission of Adelaide created a 15-team competition, the McIntyre final six system was introduced. Under this system two elimination finals were played with the fifth-placed side playing sixth and the third-placed playing fourth. The losing teams were eliminated. This arrangement was amended for the next two seasons, when fourth played fifth and third played sixth. Elimination finals were not played from 1994 to 1999.

With the introduction of the McIntyre final eight system in 1994, four qualifying finals were played in the first week when first played eighth, second played seventh, third played sixth and fourth played fifth. Under this system, the two lowest-placed losing teams were eliminated. The elimination final was re-introduced in 2000 as part of the revised final eight system. Under the current scheme, the fifth-placed team plays eighth and sixth-placed plays seventh. The losers are eliminated and winners play the losers of the qualifying finals in the semi finals.

A GREAT FULL FORWARD

Coming to St Kilda in 1929 from Wagga Wagga in New South Wales, **Wilbur “Bill” Mohr** was originally played on the half back flank but, when moved to the forward line, he became one of the League’s great full forwards. He was the Saints’ leading goalkicker from 1929 to 1940 (inclusive) kicking a total of 735 goals in his 195 games for the club, second only in the club’s history to Tony Lockett who kicked 898 goals in his 183 games for the Saints. Mohr led the VFL goalkicking in 1936 with 101 goals, becoming the first Saint to achieve the century. He kicked ten goals in a match on three occasions, captained the club in 1937, won their best and fairest award in 1932 and 1936 and represented Victoria 18 times. Mohr was one of the first players inducted into the AFL Hall of Fame in 1996. In 2001 he was named on the half forward flank in St Kilda’s Team of the Century. The *Encyclopedia of AFL Footballers* says of Mohr:

“He could boot goals from any sort of angle or from long distances with every variety of the punt kick and with the frequent magnificent drop kick. Mohr had the rare skill of being able to kick a goal from the seemingly impossible situation.”

ELIMINATION FINALS AT THE MCG (1980-2018)

The first eight elimination finals from 1972 to 1979 were held at VFL Park, Waverley. In 1980 Richmond was to play in the qualifying final, but as a MCG tenant the Tigers were forced under then League rules to play this match at the neutral VFL Park. As both qualifying and elimination finals were to be played at the same time, the 1980 elimination final was scheduled for the MCG. An elimination final has not been played at the MCG since 2018 when Melbourne defeated Geelong before 91,767 fans. The highest score in an elimination final at the MCG is 158 points recorded by Carlton 22.26 (158) against North Melbourne 5.10 (40) in 1987. The highest score overall was 26.10 (166) by Adelaide against Essendon in the first elimination final at Football Park in 2009. The lowest score at the MCG is 5.10 (40) by North Melbourne in 1987 and Melbourne's winning margin of 118 points that year is the largest recorded for an elimination final. The lowest score overall is Sydney's 4.6 (30) against Greater Western Sydney at the SCG in 2018. The highest score in a quarter at the MCG is 10.7 (67) by Collingwood in the last quarter against Fitzroy in 1984. Collingwood kicked 23.15 (153) to defeat Fitzroy by 46 points after leading by only four points at three-quarter time. This is also the overall elimination final record. The most goals in an elimination final at the MCG is six, shared by Jason Dunstall for Hawthorn against Adelaide in 1993 and Mark Williams for Collingwood against Fitzroy in 1984. The overall record is nine by Tony Lockett for St Kilda against Geelong at Waverley Park in 1991 but St Kilda lost by seven points. The highest elimination final attendance was recorded on Sunday September 8, 2013 when 94,690 saw Carlton defeat Richmond by 20 points at the MCG.

GREATER WESTERN SYDNEY – THEIR FIRST FINAL

Having entered the AFL competition in 2012, the Giants were in just their fifth season when the club played in its first finals series in 2016. GWS had finished fourth that year, and met the minor premiers, the Sydney Swans, in the first qualifying final. On September 10, 2016, the Giants faced Sydney at Stadium Australia, and despite the game being played in the western Sydney suburb of Homebush, the crowd of 60,222 was very pro-Swans. The match was tight throughout the first half, and only two points separated the teams at half time, with the Giants 5.9 (39) to the Swans 5.7 (37). However, in the third quarter the Giants kicked four goals to Swans one to go into the three-quarter time break 21 points up. Greater Western Sydney would extend their lead in the final quarter to win 12.19 (91) to 7.13 (55). The 36-point margin was Sydney's heaviest loss for the season. Jeremy Cameron booted four goals for the Giants, while many also regarded Stephen Coniglio, Tom Scully, Lachlan Whitfield and Toby Greene, as the best players for GWS that evening. Two weeks later, Greater Western Sydney, having made the first preliminary final, would be defeated by the Western Bulldogs by six points in a classic match at the Sydney Showground. Meanwhile, Sydney, having defeated Adelaide in a semi final and then Geelong in the second preliminary final, lost to the Bulldogs in the 2016 AFL grand final.
