AUSTRALIA v SRI LANKA IN TWENTY20 INTERNATIONALS



The first Twenty20 International (T20I) was played between New Zealand and Australia at Eden Park in Auckland on February 17, 2005 with Australia winning by 44 runs. Australia and Sri Lanka played their first T20I in Cape Town at the group stage of the first ICC World T20 in South Africa on September 20, 2007, Australia winning by 10 wickets. Australia won two of the first three matches played between the two countries but the Sri Lankans then took to the new version of the game with quite some aplomb and won five matches against the Australians in little more than two years including three in Australia. In recent years however the competition between two countries has been more even but with a flavour of the unusual: both teams have won away and lost at home. Sri Lanka has enjoyed more success than Australia to date at the T20 international tournaments. Australia has yet to defeat Sri Lanka in a T20I on the MCG.

THE 2019/20 SERIES

This match is the third and last in the series. The first was played on October 27, 2019 at the Adelaide Oval while the second was contested at Woolloongabba, Brisbane on October 30, 2019.

AUSTRALIA v SRI LANKA IN T20IS AT THE MCG

Today is only the third time that the two countries have met at the MCG in the T20I format. In their first encounter on January 28, 2013, Sri Lanka won by 2 runs under the Duckworth Lewis system (due to a rain delay).

Their most recent match at the MCG was on February 17, 2017. It was the first of a three-match T20I series; the other fixtures being in Geelong and Adelaide. The Australians lost the series 2-1. The T20Is against Sri Lanka formed the final act in a four-nation programme for the 2016/17 season; the intrepid supporters earlier being able to feast on Pakistan in three Tests (Australia 3-0) and five ODIs (Australia 4-1) followed by New Zealand in three ODIs (Australia 3-0).

AUSTRALIA 8/168 (20 overs) (AJ Finch 43, M Klinger 38, TM Head 31; SL Malinga 2/29) lost to SRI LANKA 5/172 (20 overs) (DAS Gunaratne 52, EMDY Munaweera 44, DPDN Dickwella 30; AJ Turner 2/12, A Zampa 2/26) by five wickets. *Player of the match:* Downdegedara Gunaratne.

Sri Lanka, fresh from a series win against South Africa, won the toss and sent the Australians into bat. Acting Captain Finch (43 from 34 balls) and debutant 36 year-old Klinger (38, 32) gave their team a sound start of 76 off 10.3 overs. Wickets, however, fell with regulatory afterwards; the only other partnership of consequence being 37 between Head (31, 25) and Turner. In his first international for 12 months Malinga (2/26 from four overs) showed he had lost none of his control and guile claiming the wickets of Head and Turner in the same over for only six runs. He was well-supported by leg-spinner Prasanna (four overs for only 23 runs). Sri Lanka lost captain Tharanga early but fine aggressive batting from wicket-keeper Dickwella 30 from 25 balls) and Munaweera (44, 29) added 74 from 47 balls before they were both dismissed during an outstanding spell from Zampa (2/26 from four overs). Munaweera and Gunaratne then added 60 to set up victory. Six were required from the final over and one from the final ball but, despite tight bowling from Tye, Kapugedra's boundary sealed the result.

MAHELA JAYAWARDENE: A PRINCE AMONG SRI LANKAN BATSMEN

Denagamage Proboth Mahela de Silva Jayawardene, (known as Mahela), was born in Colombo on May 27, 1977. He was a cricketer from his early years, captaining his school's Under-13 team and began his first-class career with the Sinhalese Sports Club (SSC) in 1995. After four outstanding centuries in domestic cricket in the 1997/98 season he was selected in the Test squad for the two-Test home series against India. He debuted in the first match of the series at the R Premadasa Stadium, Colombo and became part of history; making a patient 66 in an innings total of 6/952 (dec.), a record Test innings total which still stands. In his fourth Test he recorded his maiden Test century (167) against New Zealand in Galle on a difficult turning pitch and followed up only months later with his first double century in his seventh Test - a memorable 242 against India in Colombo lasting 677 minutes over three days including 30 fours and two sixes. Jayawardene was now established as a batsman in the team and would go on to become one of the finest players of his generation. In 1998 he made his ODI debut and would go on to play 441 ODIs around the cricket world over a seven year period, scoring 12,381 runs at an average of 33.01 with a strike rate of 78.67 and a highest score of 144. In England in 2002 a highlight of Jayawardene's Test career was his first century



at Lord's when he compiled a stylish 107 in partnership with Marvan Atapattu during which they added 206. At this stage he had made eight Test centuries. He would again compile a century at the ancestral home four years later. In early 2006 Jayawardene was promoted to captain for Tests and ODIs; the team winning a Test series in Bangladesh and an ODI series (5-0) in England. Later that year he compiled a majestic 374 in a Test against South Africa at the SSC when he partnered Kumar Sangakkara while 624 was added for the third wicket – a record for all wickets in first-class cricket. Sri Lanka won the match by an innings and 153 runs. In 2007 he led his country to the final of the 2007 World Cup in the West Indies. They were, however, defeated by Australia by 53 runs. Jayawardene stepped down from the captaincy in 2009, his last Test as captain being the ill-fated match at Lahore against Pakistan when a terrorist attack resulted in eight deaths and injuries to players and an umpire. He was reinstated to captain in 2012 in all forms of the game at the start of a home Test series against England and compiled a brilliant 180 in the First Test; paving the way for a win. He captained Sri Lanka to runner-up at the 2012 World T20 at home after which he relinquished the T20I captaincy but continued to lead in the other forms of the game until 2013. Jayawardene and his great batting partner Sangakkara were part of the triumphant Sri Lankan team at the 2014 World T20I in Bangladesh (their fifth such tournament) and both retired from the shortest form of the game afterwards. Jayawardene had played 55 T20Is for his country scoring 1493 runs at an average of 31.76 with a strike rate of 133.18 and a highest score of 100. Later in 2014 he played his last Test at his beloved SSC against Pakistan, Sri Lanka winning the match and the series 2-0. Jayawardene had played in 149 Tests scoring 11814 runs at an average of 49.84 with a highest score of 374. He recorded 34 centuries, including one triple and five double) and 50 half-centuries and took 205 catches.

Mahela Jayawardene was one of the finest batsmen of his generation. His game was built on a sound technique and blessed with sweet timing, nimble footwork and a balanced body. Silken sub-continental strokes to any point emanated from his bat off either front or back foot. He was patient, had good temperament and wise shot selection enabling him to play long Test innings, a gift lacking too frequently in the modern game. A modest person he was a fine team man, a leader on the field and a developer of young men.
