



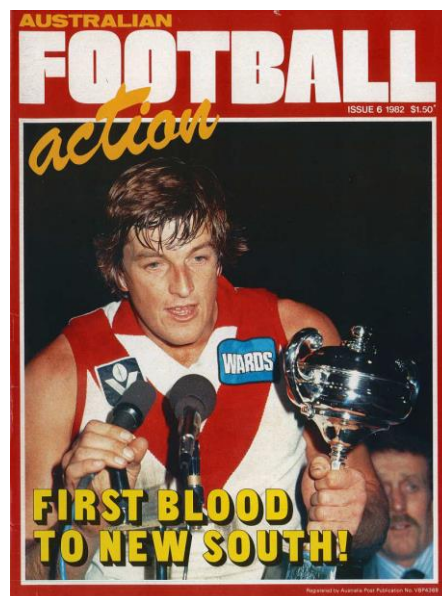

VALE BARRY ROUND

Sad news was received with the death of Barry James Round in Queensland on December 24, 2022. Aged 72 years he was a former champion with Footscray (1968-75, 135 games 136 goals), South Melbourne/Sydney (1976-85, 193 games, 157 goals) and Williamstown (1986-91, 110 games, 103 goals). With a heart to match he was a colossus at 6'4" (193cm) in height and weighed 17st (108kg). He originally joined the VFL from Warragul in Gippsland. He won the Brownlow Medal in 1981 (tying with former Footscray team-mate, Bernie Quinlan) and captained the Swans from 1980 to 1984 which included the club's move to the Sydney in 1982. In 1979 and 1981 he was the Swans' Best and Fairest winner and was selected in the South Melbourne/Sydney Team of the Century in 2003. He represented Victoria on five occasions. He was inducted into the Australian Football of Hall of Fame in 2001. His decorated career continued with Williamstown in 1986 to 1991. In 1986 he was centre half-forward in the Seagull's premierships side under captain-coach Terry Wheeler. In 1990 Round captain-coached Williamstown to the flag. In 1987 he won the VFA Best and Fairest award, the J.J. Liston Trophy. The Williamstown president, Clinton Rippon, noted: "In his presence everyone stood taller."



OVER TO YOU

1. Who am I? I played for both Melbourne and Sydney. I won the 1984 Best & Fairest with the Demons. I later won Sydney's Best and Fairest in 1986, 1987 and 1988. I was the 1988 Brownlow Medallist.
2. Who am I? I played 237 games with South Melbourne from 1956 to 1971. I won nine Swan Best and Fairest awards and three Brownlow medals. I captain-coached South Melbourne in 1965 and 1966 and coached the Demons from 1974 to 1977.
3. Who am I? I played with three AFL clubs: Melbourne (2001-2004), Sydney (2005-2009) and Collingwood (2010-2013). I played in premierships with Sydney (2005) and Collingwood (2010).
4. Who am I? I was a Demon premierships captain in 1955 and 1956. At the end of my playing career I coached South Melbourne in 1962 to 1964.
5. Who am I? I played with Melbourne from 1936 to 1939 in 35 games with 73 goals and South Melbourne from 1939 to 1941 in 29 games with 55 goals. My nickname was "Pop". My son, Ron, played with Richmond. My grandson, Paul, was an Australian Test fast bowler and a current Test umpire.

DID YOU KNOW?

The South Melbourne Football Club played its inaugural game in 1874 and first played at the MCG in 1878. South wore a blue and white hooped jersey with a red sash, blue and white socks, blue knickerbockers and a red cap. On May 25, 1878, despite fielding 25 players against Melbourne's 19 at the MCG, South Melbourne lost three goals to two. In 1879 South Melbourne proclaimed itself a senior club, and thereafter it no longer fielded teams at odds against senior opposition. It played its first senior game at the MCG on May 17, 1879, with Melbourne defeating South Melbourne two goals to nil before a crowd of 2,000. In 1880 South Melbourne amalgamated with the Albert Park Football Club, and adopted Albert Park's (now iconic) red and white jerkins, socks and caps. South Melbourne won its first Victorian/VFA premierships in 1881.

This Round in History – Round 3 on the MCG

The biggest Round 3 winner on the MCG is North Melbourne by 127 points in 1994 when the Kangaroos 25.23 (173) defeated Hawthorn 6.10 (46). The highest score in all Round 3 matches on the MCG was registered by Richmond 31.25 (211) in 1985 against St Kilda. The best score in a quarter was also recorded in this game when Richmond kicked 9.7 (61) during the third quarter. In Round 3 there have been seven drawn games, two of which have been at the MCG. The last draw at the MCG in Round 3 was in 1980 when Richmond 18.20 (128) drew with St Kilda 19.14 (128). The most goals kicked by an individual in Round 3 on the MCG is 13 by Essendon's Matthew Lloyd in 1999 against Sydney. The top attendance for a Round 3 game is 90,564 for a Richmond-Essendon game at the MCG in 1982.

SOUTH MELBOURNE/SYDNEY V MELBOURNE GREAT GOALKICKING PERFORMANCES.

- David Schwarz kicked 9.0 goals in Round 24, 1994 at the Sydney Cricket Ground. The Demons 27.5 (167) defeated the Swans 18.13 (121).
- In Round 15, 1938 Norm Smith (Melbourne) kicked 8.3 at the Lake Oval. The final scores read Melbourne 14.15 (99) to South Melbourne 9.16 (70).
- At the MCG in Round 22, 1982, Melbourne's Gerard Healy kicked 8.3 goals against Sydney. Melbourne 25.13 (163) defeated Sydney 22.16 (148).
- Allen Jakovich (Melbourne) in Round 15, 1991, kicked 8.8 goals at the Sydney Cricket Ground. Melbourne 26.21 (177) defeated Sydney 14.10 (94) by 83 points.
- In Round 5, 1942 Lindsay White (South Melbourne) kicked 12.1 goals at Princes Park. South Melbourne 23.10 (148) defeated Melbourne 16.19 (115).
- Richard Osborne (Sydney) in Round 13, 1993 kicked 10.2 goals at the Sydney Cricket Ground against Melbourne. This was Sydney's only win for the season and Osborne played just one season with the Swans. Final scores were Sydney 23.11 (149) defeated Melbourne 16.13 (109).
- In Round 11, 1934, Bob Pratt (South Melbourne) kicked 9.6 goals against Melbourne at the MCG. The final scores read: South Melbourne 22.23 (155) to Melbourne 14.15 (99).
