Around the Cricket World**THE FIRST MATCH**

Australia played its first One-Day International (ODI) in 1970/71 but it did not meet India in an ODI until the 1980/81 World Series Cup tournament. The first match was played at the MCG on December 6, 1980, India winning by 66 runs. The two teams were:

Australia: GS Chappell (captain), KJ Hughes, J Dyson, AR Border, KD Walters, TM Chappell, RW Marsh, SF Graf, DK Lillee, GF Lawson and LS Pascoe.

India: SM Gavaskar (captain), TE Srinivasan, DB Vengsarkar, GR Viswanath, KBJ Azad, SM Patil, Kapil Dev, SMH Kirmani, RMH Binny, KD Ghavri and DR Doshi.

INDIA 9/208 (49 overs) (SM Patil 64, SMH Kirmani 48*; DK Lillee 2/22, GS Chappell 2/32) **defeated AUSTRALIA 142** (42.1 overs) (KJ Hughes 35; DR Doshi 3/32, RMH Binny 2/23) **by 66 runs.** *Player of the Match:* Sandeep Patil

After being sent in to bat, the tourists, with five players appearing in their debut ODI, made 9/208, with man of the match Sandeep Patil top-scoring with 64. In reply, Australia began well with an opening partnership of 60 but wickets thereafter fell regularly against an accurate Indian attack on a slow pitch and was dismissed for 142; the last six wickets falling for 24 runs. Left-arm spinner Dilip Doshi (3/32) was the visitors' most successful bowler.

THE MOST RECENT MATCH

The most recent ODI played between Australia and India was at Adelaide Oval on 15 January, 2019 during India's current tour of Australia. It was the second match of the series; with Australia winning the first match at the SCG on January 12, 2019. The two teams were:

AUSTRALIA 9/298 (50 overs) (SE Marsh 131, GJ Maxwell 48; B Kumar 4/35, Mohammed Shami 3/58) **were defeated by INDIA 4/299** (49.2 overs) (V Kohli 104; MS Dhoni 55*, RG Sharma 43) **by six wickets.**

Australia v India ODIs at the MCG

Fourteen have been played to date. India was successful in four of the first five, including the first, in December 1980. Australia then won the next five contests, before India returned to the winning list in February 2008. Australia won the most recent encounter at the MCG, on January 17, 2016

Scores: **INDIA 6/295** (50 overs) (V Kohli. 117, S Dhawan 68; AM Rahane 50; JW Hastings 4/58) **lost to AUSTRALIA 7/296** (48.5 overs) (GJ Maxwell 96, SE Marsh 62, SPD Smith 41; RA Jadeja 2/49, I Sharma 2/53, UT Yadav 2/68), **by three wickets.** *Man of the match:* Glenn Maxwell.

Four centuries have been scored. The highest is Rohit Sharma's 138 (139 balls, nine fours and four sixes) in January 2015 which comprised more than half his team's total followed by Virat Kohli's 117 (117 balls, seven fours and two sixes) in January 2016. The other two were scored in the same match in January 2000: Ricky Ponting struck 115 from 121 balls, with nine fours and a six, while India's Sourav Ganguly made 100 from 127 balls, with 10 fours, as the home side (7/269) defeated India (6/241) by 28 runs. Three Australians have made scores in the 90s: Graeme Wood (98* in January 1981), Aaron Finch (96 in January 2015) and Glenn Maxwell (96 in January 2016). One score in the 90s for India was scored by Kris Srikkanth (93* in January 1985). Six hauls of four or more wickets have been recorded, three for India: Ajit Agarkar (6/42) in 2003/04, Kapil Dev (4/30) in 1985/86 and Ishant Sharma (4/38) in 2007/08, and three for Australia: Mitchell Starc (6/43) in 2014/15, Clint McKay (4/20) in 2011/12 and John Hastings (4/58) in 2015/16.

A STATISTICAL VIEW

To date Australia has met India in 130 ODIs, winning 75, losing 45 with the remaining 10 failing to produce a result. The highest score by either side is India's 6/383 (Rohit Sharma 209) at Bangalore in November 2013. Australia's highest is 2/359 (Ricky Ponting 140*, Damien Martyn 88*) in the 2003 World Cup final at Johannesburg. Remarkably it subsequently twice equalled this total: 5/359 (Matthew Hayden 126) in the second final of the 2003/04 VB series at Sydney in February 2004 and 5/359 again at Jaipur (George Bailey 92*) in October 2013. The lowest score is India's 63 (Greg Chappell 5/15) at the SCG in January 1981. Australia's lowest is its 101 (Ravi Shastri 5/15) at Perth in December 1991. Notes on Table:

- The ten no result matches were in India at Trivandrum and Jamshedpur 1984, Hyderabad 1986, Bangalore 2007 and Ranchi 2013, Amstelveen (Netherlands) 2004, Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia) 2006, in Australia at Brisbane 2008 and Sydney 2015 and in Pretoria (South Africa) 2009.
- Of the 24 matches played at neutral venues five were part of ICC World Cups in England 1983, (Nottingham and Chelmsford) and 1999 (The Oval) and South Africa 2003 (Pretoria and Johannesburg). Two were part of other ICC tournaments (ICC Knockout at Nairobi, Kenya in 2000 and Champions Trophy, Pretoria in 2009). A further six matches were played as part of tournaments in Sharjah (UAE) in 1987 and 1998 while the remainder have been played in tournaments around the cricket world.
- A further five matches set down for Indian venues, Cuttack (1996/97 and 2013/14), Mumbai (2009/10) and Kochi and Margao (2010/11) were abandoned (no toss taking place) due to inclement weather and are not included in the total played.
- The 30 match gap in Australia's wins to date (74) compared to that of India (44) is mostly a result of its superiority at home. In India and at neutral venues little separates the two countries in performance. In the matches played between the countries to date around the cricket world Australia's match-winning sequences have been greater and more frequent than those of India as shown:

Adam Gilchrist: A Glance at an Outstanding Career

Adam Gilchrist needs little or no introduction. Former Test opening batsman Keith Stackpole nominated him as "the most dynamic cricketer to play for Australia since Sir Donald Bradman". The sheer brilliance, power and variety of his strokeplay, always classical never crude, not only thrilled spectators but also had the capacity to determine or alter the course of match within a breath-takingly short course of time. There is no better example of this than his 149 from 104 balls when opening the innings in the 2007 World Cup final in Barbados, which put the match well beyond Sri Lanka's reach. In addition to his batting, his error-free glovework made him an all-rounder in the purest sense of the term. His performances in all levels of the game resulted in him being widely-acclaimed as the greatest wicketkeeper-batsman of all time, setting new standards for the dual role. For the record, Gilchrist played 287 One-Day Internationals, in which he made 9619 runs (second only to Ricky Ponting's 13704 for an Australian) at an average of 35.89, including 16 centuries, and effected 472 dismissals (417 caught, 55 stumped). His Test career amounted to 5570 runs at 47.60, with 17 centuries, and 416 dismissals (379 caught, 37 stumped) in 96 matches. He also appeared in 17 Twenty-20 Internationals during the early days of the format, scoring 272 runs at 22.66 and taking 17 catches.

Test Your ODI Knowledge

The **first** official (Australian Cricket Board) day-night ODI was staged at the SCG on 27 November, 1979 as part of the inaugural *World Series* matches between Australia, England and the West Indies. The MCG became the **third** stadium to stage a day-night ODI on 17 February, 1985 when the lights were turned on during the match between Australia and England.
