VALE BILLY PICKEN

The football world was saddened to learn of the death of Collingwood star Billy Picken on July 23. Recruited from the Macarthur League, he arrived at Collingwood in 1974 at the age of 17, making his debut in Round 5 against Carlton. Originally a forward, he soon developed into a talented centre half back. Billy played a total of 212 games (46 goals) for the Magpies, including four losing grand finals and the 1977 drawn grand final, before transferring to Sydney in 1984, where he played 28 games (0 goals), a number of injuries causing him to retire in 1985. He won Collingwood's Copeland Trophy in 1978 and 1983, was named an All-Australian in 1983, and was named on the half-back flank in the club's Team of the Century in 1997. In 2006 he was inducted into the Magpies' Hall of Fame. He is the father of Western Bulldogs player Liam, and former Brisbane Lions player Marcus.

PLAYED WITH BOTH TEAMS

- **Josh Mahoney:** Collingwood (1997-1998), 19 games, 8 goals, Western Bulldogs (1999-2000), 11 games, 2 goals, Port Adelaide (2004-2007), 67 games, 77 goals. A gutsy and dogged defender he later developed into a forward and took his opportunity to gain a position in Port's 2004 premiership team.
- **Scott Cummings:** Essendon (1994-1996), 40 games, 83 goals, Port Adelaide (1997-1998), 37 games, 102 goals, West Coast (1999-2001), 46 games, 158 goals, Collingwood (2002), 5 games, 6 goals. A well-travelled footballer who played with four clubs, registered 128 games and kicked 349 goals. He was awarded the Coleman Medal in 1999 when he topped the tally with 88 goals for West Coast. At Essendon he topped the goalkicking in 1994 with 32 goals. He led Port's goal kicking in their inaugural season, 1997, when he kicked 70 goals. In the year he won the Coleman Medal he kicked 88 goals in the home and away season and, with the finals, he registered a total of 95 goals.
- **Cameron Cloke:** Collingwood (2004-2006), 21 games, 11 goals, Carlton (2007-2009), 36 games, 25 goals, Port Adelaide (2010), 1 game, 0 goals. The son of David Cloke, who played with both Richmond and Collingwood, he was one of three Cloke brothers who played at the top level. Cameron was recruited from Park Orchards and Eastern Ranges Under 18s. He showed promise and didn't take a backward step, however his career was severely hampered by a serious shoulder injury.

FINALS BETWEEN PORT ADELAIDE AND COLLINGWOOD

Since entering the AFL in 1997, Port Adelaide have played Collingwood in three finals.

- The 2002 first qualifying final at Football Park. Collingwood 16.12 (108) defeated Port Adelaide 14.11 (95). The Magpies' Leon Davis booted three goals and Port's Peter Burgoyne and Stuart Dew kicked three goals each.
- In the 2003 second preliminary final at the MCG, Collingwood 17.10 (112) defeated Port Adelaide 9.14 (68). Collingwood went on to be defeated by the Brisbane Lions in the grand final.
- In the 2013 second elimination final at the MCG, Port Adelaide 12.15 (87) defeated Collingwood 9.9 (63). Chad Wingard and Jay Schultz each kicked three goals for Port Power and Dane Swan booted three goals for the Magpies.

This Round in History – Round 20 on the MCG

The highest Round 20 score at the MCG is 32.24 (216) by Hawthorn against Essendon 8.8 (56) in 1992. This is the overall record Round 20 score. The most goals by an individual at the MCG in Round 20 is 12. This record is shared by two players. Gary Ablett kicked a dozen for Geelong against Richmond in 1990. The Cats scored 24.14 (158) and won by 64 points. Jason Dunstall also kicked 12 goals for Hawthorn against Essendon in 1992. The overall Round 20 record is 13 shared by Doug Wade for Geelong against North Melbourne at Kardinia Park in 1971 when Geelong kicked 24.7 (151) and won by 75 points, and Peter Daicos for Collingwood against Brisbane at Carrara in 1991. Collingwood kicked 26.16 (172) and won by 101 points. The highest score in a quarter is 10.3 (63) by Melbourne in the third quarter against North Melbourne in 1991. Melbourne finished with 20.20 (140) to win by 52 points. The overall Round 20 record is 11.6 (72) by Collingwood in the third quarter against Essendon at Victoria Park in 1970. Collingwood kicked 24.16 (160) to win by 81 points. The highest Round 20 attendance at the MCG was recorded at a night game on Friday August 5, 1994 when 75,565 saw Collingwood defeat Essendon by 28 points.

PORT ADELAIDE MAGPIES

Midway through the 1990 football season the SANFL's Port Adelaide Football Club applied to join the AFL. Collingwood opposed Port Adelaide's 1990 AFL bid, citing confusion in the magpie brands and similar jumper designs. Port had adopted black and white colours in 1902, was called the magpies in the press that year, and used magpies in its emblem by the club's 1908 annual report. The club's trademark since 1975 had been a magpie in a disc (left). Had Port's 1990 bid been successful,

that emblem would have been dropped. Collingwood had also used magpie iconography from 1892, its first year, and the respective club logos seem to have mimicked each other last century, such as one of a magpie standing on a fence rail (Collingwood from 1951 and Port from 1954). Collingwood's emblem in 1990 (right) was created in 1985 and derived from a similar version used in 1983. However, unlike Port's bird, Collingwood's had been reversed in 1982 to be "forward looking" to the right. The 1985 version of Collingwood's emblem was replaced in 1992 for the club's centenary logo, which retained a magpie looking to the right. Port's magpie logo was used by its SANFL team until 2019, albeit with the club's name on the disc having a different word order and orientation from 1996 to 2010. It was replaced by the club's 150th anniversary logo, which is without a magpie, in 2020.
